A. Psychology OR B. Philosophy of Religion (Course Code- APPHI 501DSE -1)	CO7: The nature and scope of Psychology and its different schools are introduced. OR We have introduced the origin and development of religion and its relation to dharma and dhamma, along with a discussion on the nature and scope of philosophy of religion
The Religion of Man: R. N. Tagore (Course Code- APPHI 503GE -1)	CO8: Tagore sought to give a philosophy of man in which human nature is characterized by a concept of surplus energy that finds expression in creative art.
Value Education (Course Code-APPHI 504SEC -3)	CO9: Students will understand the importance of value based living. Students will understand and start applying the essential steps to become good leaders.
SEM-VI	
A. Socio Political Philosophy OR B. Inductive Logic (Western) (Course Code-APPHI 601DSE -2)	CO10: This course educates the students about ways to apply the ethical norms in the society and its effect on the society. It enhances the knowledge of socio-political movements, about the notion of freedom, duty & right etc. OR It gives emphasis how to maintain validity in argumentations ; it also teaches us how one, from insufficient available information, can proceed towards justified generalization..
Feminism (Course Code-APPHI 603GE -2)	CO11: An introduction to the idea of Feminism and its evolution is provided. Key issues such as sexuality, gender, self-other binary are discussed briefly.
Philosophy of Human Rights (Course Code-APPHI 604SEC -4)	CO12: While the concept of human rights today plays an important role both in law and in politics (domestic and international), it is also a concept which is firmly grounded in philosophical discussions of rights.
